

Our goal is to elevate the art - literally and figuratively. To create an exhilarating experience that builds new audiences, strengthens the community of practitioners, and expands the art form to help it soar.

Founded in 2014 at Zaccho Studio in Bayview Hunter's Point, the San Francisco Aerial Arts Festival is now located at Fort Mason Center for Arts and Culture in the beautiful Marina District. Against the backdrop of the San Francisco Bay, aerial artists bring stunning and innovative performance to local audiences and tourists alike.

Our festival is San Francisco's premiere aerial arts event that features internationally recognized aerial artists and exciting newcomers breaking into the field. This biennial festival brings together spectacle, daring athleticism, aerial dance and circus to create a dynamic three day performance event.


The San Francisco Bay Area is home to some of the most important pioneers in aerial dance and award winning circus aerial artists. Zaccho Dance Theatre is celebrating these unconventional and innovative artists along with their international counterparts in a thrilling weekend of performances on the bay.

Our goal is to further this expansion in 2018 when we will broaden our programming to include the finest and most innovative aerial artists and architects working nationally and internationally.

We firmly believe that San Francisco can become the focus of the aerial performance community and that this festival can easily grow to become one of the most inspiring, talked-about and well-attended new festivals in the United States.

Joanna Haigood (Choreographer/ Director) is best known for her innovative site specfic and aerial performances. Since 1979 Joanna has been creating work that uses natural, architectural and cultural environments as points of departure for movement exploration and narrative. Her stages have included grain terminals, a landmark San Francisco clock tower, the Pope's Palace in France, military forts, and a mile of urban neighborhood streets in the South Bronx. Her commissions include Dancing in the Streets, Jacob's Pillow Dance Festival, Walker Arts Center, the Exploratorium Museum, the National Black Arts Festival, Festival d'Avignon and Equal Justice Society. She has been honored with the Guggenheim Fellowship, the Cal/Alpert Award, the US Artist Fellowship, a Bessie Award and is recipient of the esteemed Doris Duke Performing Artist Award.

Chris Wangro (Co-Producer) One-time Circus Ring-Master and former tzar of Special Events for the City of New York, Chris Wangro is acclaimed as one of the leading and most imaginative impresarios of public events in America. He has produced presidential summits, papal visits and massive public spectacles for over three decades. Wangro has created and directed prestigious arts festivals, numerous concert series & cultural expositions for private and public organizations and masterminded events and for multiple United Nations agencies, dozens of NGOs and international humanitarian organizations that have generated hundreds of millions of dollars and global media attention for those in need around the world.






Zaccho Dance Theatre (ZDT) creates and presents performance work that investigates dance as it relates to place. Artistic Director Joanna Haigood's creative work focuses on making dances that use natural, architectural and cultural environments as points of departure for movement exploration and narrative. Haigood's innovative work involves in-depth research into the history and the character of sites, often involving local communities in the creative process, and typically integrates aerial flight and suspension as ways of expanding performers' spatial and dynamic range. In addition, Zaccho provides performances in San Francisco, nationally and internationally as well as an arts education program for the local community.

Zaccho Dance Theatre's home is San Francisco's Bayview Hunters Point (BVHP) where Zaccho manages a large Studio that is utilized for rehearsal, performances, and educational activities for youth and adults. Zaccho is the only nonprofit dance company in the BVHP district of San Francisco. The company's arts education program was created to integrate our nationally renowned, highly innovative performance work with the experiences of our young neighbors. For over 24 years, Zaccho Youth Performance Arts Program has served 100-150 children annually by offering free in-school and after-school classes and performance opportunities to students 7-17 years old.

Zaccho's Center for Dance and Aerial Arts (CDAA) offers afterschool, evening and weekend classes that specialize in technical training, composition, improvisation and performance. CDAA classes stand behind Zaccho's philosophy of bridging a strong skill set with personal creativity. We aim to provide opportunities for students of all ages, levels and backgrounds to train and explore the possibilities of dance, aerial dance and movement research as well as to create a space where a diverse constituency comprised of local community members and fine art enthusiasts can congregate, explore and build new relationships.



Fort Mason Center for Arts & Culture (FMCAC) is a nonprofit operating within a Historic Landmark District along the northern waterfront of the San Francisco Bay. Part of the Golden Gate National Recreation Area, FMCAC hosts an ever-evolving rotation of artistic programming for over 1.2 million annual visitors that includes theater and dance performances, art installations, as well as educational and cultural classes. As part of Fort Mason Center for Arts & Culture's commitment to supporting San Francisco's artistic community, FMCAC provides approximately \$2.5 million in annual grants to local arts organizations. These grants allow groups to produce diverse and innovative works at the historic campus.

In addition to the thousands of events that occur each year on campus, FMCAC hosts nearly two dozen nonprofit and arts organizations as permanent residents. These residents receive annual support from FMCAC, allowing them to focus on producing original artistic programming. Current residents include the Pulitzer Prize winning Magic Theatre, City College's Fort Mason Art Campus, BATS Improv, the SFMOMA Artists Gallery and the internationally acclaimed Greens Restaurant.

A pioneer in the reuse of military bases, Fort Mason Center for Arts & Culture has been honored by the California Preservation Foundation for its efforts preserving the historic U.S. Army San Francisco Port of Embarkation.







NEHARA KALEV AND GLENN EASLE




NEHARA KALEV hunts the enchanted, the fleeting and the invisible. Growing up in New York City, dance captured her at a very young age. It refuses leave. The never-ending complexities of the body and theatrical performance-

making persistently haunt Nehara. This madness has taken her around the world many times, with new perspectives seeping in from six continents. She continues experimenting with states of being through interdisciplinary performance. Creating and performing works with major support from private foundations, public institutions, and artistic residencies, Nehara thanks all who have invested in her visions on nehara.com. With a Master of Fine Arts from UCLA, Nehara has pursued her passion for teaching at universities on the east and west coasts and the United Kingdom. She has performed featured roles with Diavolo Dance Theater, toured with David Rousseve/Reality, worked with The Los Angeles Opera and found an inspirational home in The Rachel Rosenthal Company. Nehara is captivated by the surprises of the collaborative process.

GLENN EASLEY is an architect who's run away with the circus. A 28-year history of professional engagement with architecture and design is now deluged with upsidedown maneuvers twenty feet above ground, and overrun with overhead human-balancing.

Drawing upon a rich combination of disciplines, Glenn creates designs for apparatus, builds structures for performance, sculpts interactive spaces, and collaborates to make art across disciplines. A steady commitment to music and martial arts led to performances with distinguished percussion ensembles and three black belts. His creative works favor a subtle approach and are infused with the grace of efficiency. Glenn currently collaborates as a sculptor, aerialist, acroyogi, rigger, architect, percussionist and father.

THE PALOMA PROJECT



Exploring the intimate relationship between a dancer and her environment, The Paloma Project develops site-specific, multidisciplinary choreography that enmeshes ancient traditions with avantgarde sensibilities. Using flight and contemporary movement as metaphors for the human condition, director Ninette Paloma draws artists together from across the globe to pursue the delicate details of a unique floor to air movement language that blurs any distinction between grounded and aerial dancing. To date, The Paloma Project has united twenty four dancers from Portugal to Costa Rica for the debut of evening-length works that have toured in France, New York, Chicago, and California. www.sbaerial.com

years, Ninette Paloma's feet have been dangling over the edges of dusty stages the world over, combining her training in contemporary dance, physical theatre, gymnastics, and aerial dance to develop a highly detailed movement language in the art of contemporary flight. In 2006, she founded the Santa Barbara Centre for Aerial Dance, a year-round conservatory inviting students and professionals from across the globe

to train and develop a performance voice in the floor to air® pedagogy. From 2011-2016, Ms. Paloma choreographed six full-length stage works debuting in California, New York, Illinois, Arizona, and France. Ms. Paloma has served as board of director's president for the Santa Barbara Dance Alliance, is a freelance dance writer for the Santa Barbara Independent, and heads the Santa Barbara Floor to Air Festival, an annual international aerial dance festival on the American Riviera.

DANIELLE GARRISON is an M.F.A Candidate in Aerial Dance at the University of Colorado in Boulder, Danielle Garrison is a dancer, choreographer, and teacher. From 2007- 2012, she served as Assistant Director for Aerial Dance Chicago and was a Teaching Artist for the Joffrey Ballet and the Colorado Ballet. Currently, Danielle is a dancer and student company director for Frequent Flyers® Aerial Dance. She has had the pleasure of performing and teaching at the Frequent Flyers® Aerial Dance Festival; the Santa Barbara Floor to Air Festival; the Olympic Stadium for Aerial Ever After in Athens, Greece; Les Rencontres de Danse Aérienne, in France.

ISABEL BARENSE is a graduate of the Santa Barbara Centre for Aerial Dance's Performance Development pedagogy program and a principal dancer for The Paloma Project. For over seven years, she has trained in the disciplines of trapeze, lyra, corde lisse, fabrics, sling, and invented apparatus, performing in three evening length aerial dance productions including 2014 Belline, 2015 Petite Fleche, and 2016 Elemental You under the direction of Ninette Paloma and debuting in California, Illinois, and New York. Excerpts were performed at the Santa Barbara Floor to Air Festival, IV Light Festival, Santa Barbara Summer Solstice Festival, and Mark Dendy Projects.

LYDIA JOHNSON graduated with a BA in dance from the University of

North Carolina at Chapel Hill before discovering her love of Aerial Dance. She has studied the disciplines of Fabrics, Lyra, Corde Lisse, Sling, and Trapeze for five years at the Santa Barbara Centre for Aerial Dance and has performed in the Santa Barbara Floor to Air Festival, and in two evening-length works for The Paloma Project including Belline and Elemental You.

RACHNA HAILEY is a graduate of the Santa Barbara Centre for Aerial Dance's Performance Development pedagogy program, Santa Barbara native Rachna Hailey is a principal dancer for The Paloma Project, and co-founder of The Apiary Works in Carpinteria, California. Trained in six aerial dance disciplines including lyra, fabrics, corde lisse, trapeze, sling, and invented apparatus, Ms. Hailey has performed in the 2015 debut of Belline, the 2016 debut of Elemental You, The Santa Barbara Floor to Air Festival, and the Santa Barbara Summer Solstice Festival.



CHERIE CARSON, Artistic Director/ Choreographer Cherie Carson performed her first aerial dance piece in 1990 and incorporated video into her underwater dance performance "Water Dreams" in 1992, a finalist for the Robert Bennett Award, LA. She has choreographed site specific work for planetariums, galleries, sculpture gardens, in lakes & swimming pools, hanging from a bungee cord in a Banyan tree. In 1998, Cherie performed to sold-out houses at the Edinburgh Festival Fringe in Edinburgh, Scotland. 




The Festival Pavilion, originally known as Pier 3 at the Port of Embarkation, was built in 1912 and was used to warehouse army supplies and provide docking space for army transport ships. From the 1920s through World War II, the San Francisco Port of Embarkation played a critical role in the movement of supplies and troops to the Pacific. It functioned as the nerve center of a vast network of shipping facilities that spread throughout the Bay Area. The numbers of men and supplies that passed through the San Francisco Port of Embarkation were enormous. During the 45 months of war, 1,647,174 passengers and 23,589,472 measured tons moved under the San Francisco Port of Embarkation into the Pacific. This total represents two-thirds of all troops sent into the Pacific and more than one-half of all Army cargo moved through West Coast ports.

Much of the content of the performance is drawn from interviews with WW II veterans based in the Bay Area and the personal histories of the collaborating artists, all of whom have ties to the Army and the WW II legacy.

Amelia holds Bachelors and Masters degrees in comparative religion from Swarthmore College and the Graduate Theological Union, Berkeley. Her intellectual and artistic sensibilities inform her work inspiring practical, spiritual, theoretical and political creativity. Her choreography has explored dance in theaters and on buildings and cliffs all over the US and in 17 countries around the world. Amelia is continually challenged and inspired by her experiences in nature, with her dancers and with communities that unearth and clarify her values, identity and art. Rudolph and BANDALOOP have been designated by the Trisha Brown Company to re-mount and perform Brown's seminal work "Man Walking Down the Side of a Building" exclusively throughout the world with performances in Paris and Vienna this fall. The recent BANDALOOP video "Waltz on the Walls of City Hall" in which Amelia is featured, garnered two million views on YouTube.


